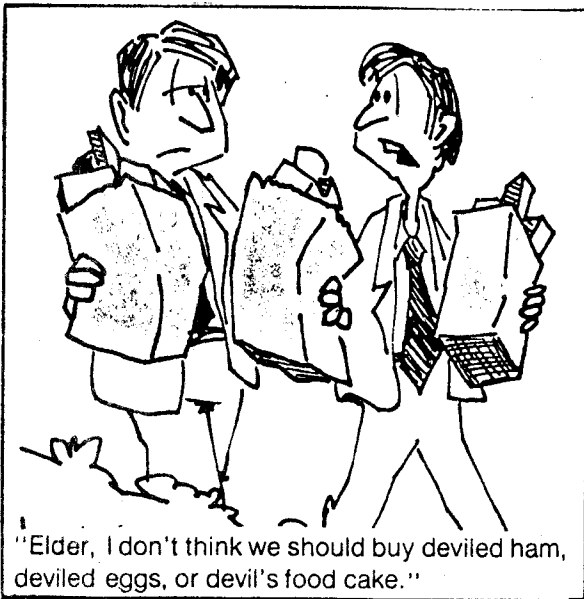


## Washington Spokane

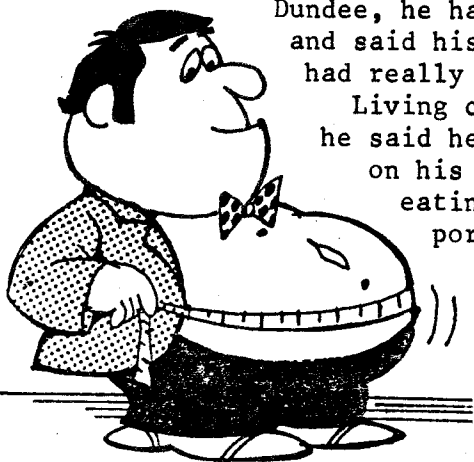
## Scotland Edinburgh

## Relief Society

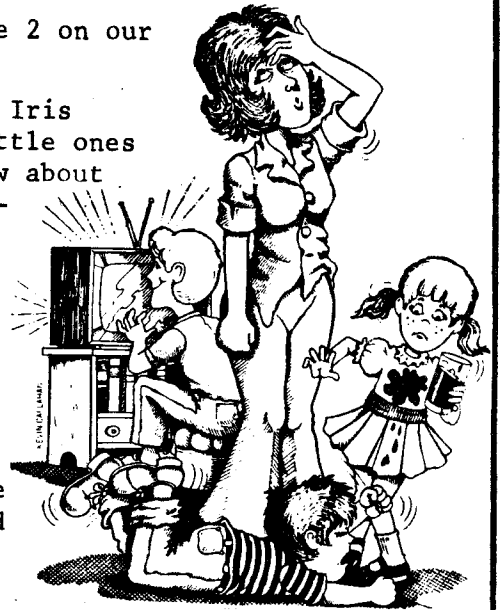

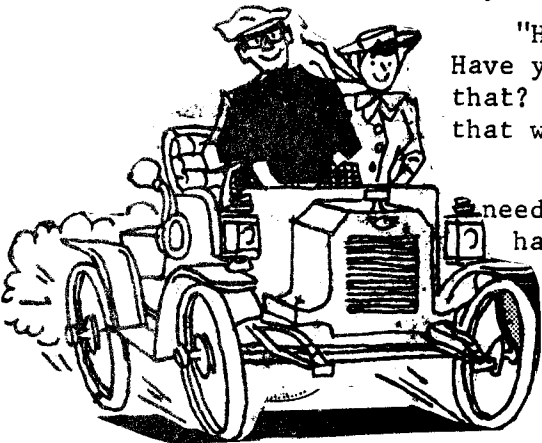


"Hello Utah!" Sound interesting?

### PARK CITY OVEN STEW

(It can be cooking while a family is out on the slopes skiing, hence the name.)

2 1/2 pounds beef	8 medium potatoes, peeled and quartered
1 pkg. dried onion soup	8 large carrots, cut in four chunks each
1 can (8 oz.) tomato sauce	1 can (10½ oz.) cream of mushroom soup
2 bay leaves	1 can (10½ oz.) cream of celery soup

In large heavy casserole or kettle place half the beef cubes; sprinkle with half of the vegetables, then repeat. Arrange bay leaves on top of vegetables. Sprinkle with dried onion soup. Combine cream of mushroom soup, cream of celery soup and tomato sauce, then pour over top of stew. Cover and bake at 250 degrees F. for 6 to 8 hours. Makes 8 to 10 servings.

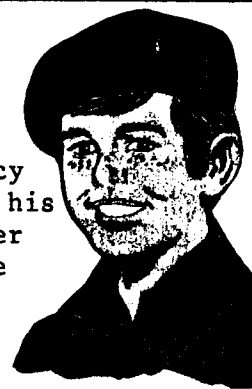

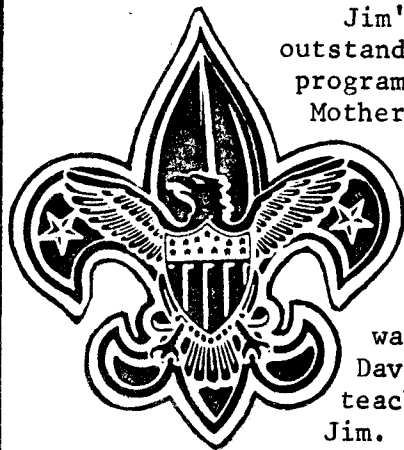
JIM McGUIRE

Jim didn't want to go back to the house, so when he showed his reluctance to go to his mother the man looked a little puzzled and asked him if that was his mother. Jim told him "No!" The man was hesitant to hand him over. Jim's mother just replied, "Keep him if you want, I think you'll be more than glad to bring him back after a while."

Jim has always had an enthusiasm and zest for life that is contagious to those around him. This has been to his advantage most of the time. His sixth grade reading teacher told his father, "I know Jim's doing things he shouldn't, it's just that I never seem to be able to catch him. 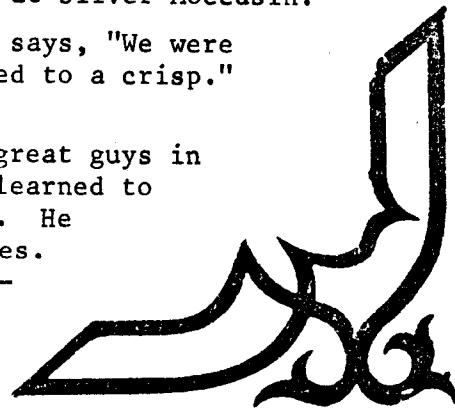

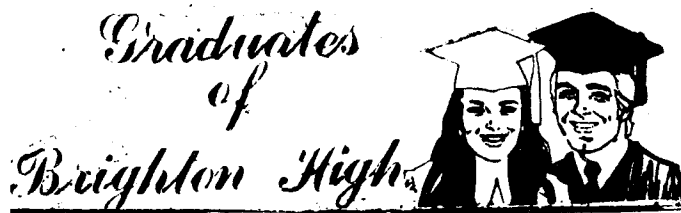

Also, recently baptized Stephanie Gollaher was confirmed on May 3 by her grandfather, Monty (Clarence) Montgomery.





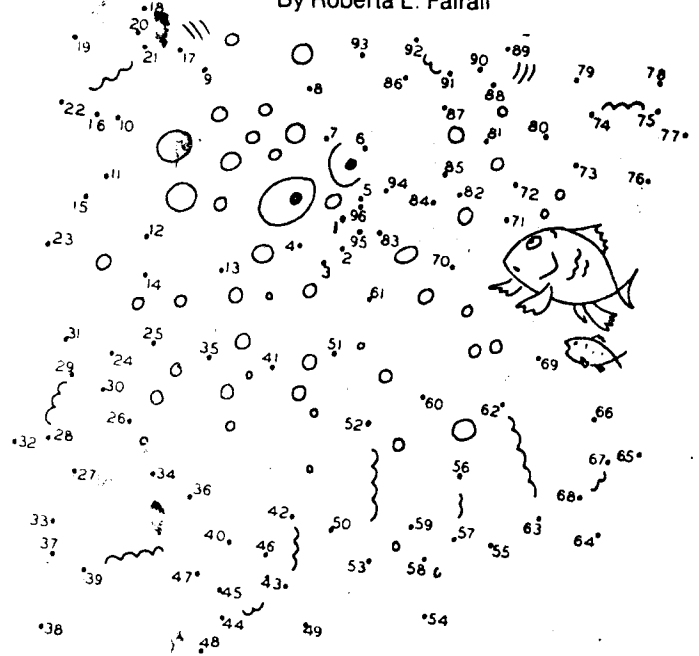

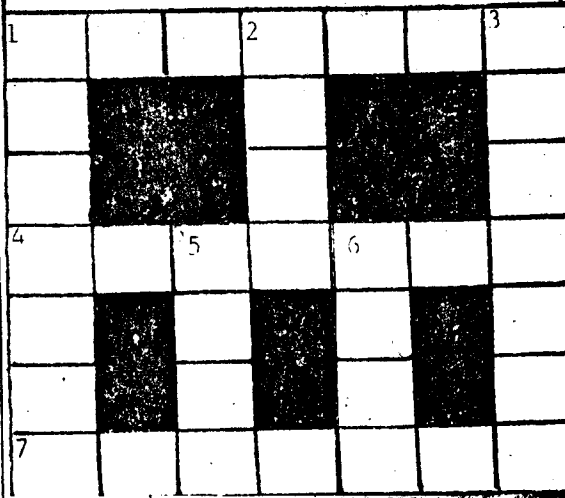


