
Great will be your blessings. May the Lord bless you in this challenge.

Mission News



A year has nearly passed since Kerry left for his mission. All is well and happy with him--missions have a special way of doing this to people. Mom Anderson Reporting



Lynn sounds good and says his mission is great. He has been transferred to Walla Walla again. He likes it there and is glad to get out of the daily rain.



2 1/2 pounds beef	8 medium potatoes, peeled and quartered
l pkg. dried onion soup	8 large carrots, cut in four chunks each

#### JIM McGUIRE Attained Eagle May 19, 1981

Jim started running when he was 8 months old and he has never stopped since. He has made life very interesting and spicy at the McGuire home. When he was about 2 years old he followed his brother and sisters up to Danish Road to catch the bus for school. After the bus left, instead of coming back to the house, he ventured across the road and got caught in a barb wire fence. A construction worker driving by stopped and freed him from the barb wire. In the meantime his mother had heard him screaming and had arrived at the top of Danish Road about the same time the man had rescued him. Jim didn't want to go back to the

house, so when he showed his reluctance to go to his mother the man looked a little puzzled and asked him if that was his mother. Jim told him "No!" The man was hesitant to hand him over. Jim's mother just replied, "Keep him if you want, I think you'll be more than glad to bring him back after a while."

Jim has always had an enthusiasm and zest for life that is contageous to those around him. This has been to his advantage most of the time. His sixth grade reading teacher told his father, "I know Jim's doing things he shouldn't, it's just that I never seem to be able to catch him. Every time I look, he's just standing there with a grin on his face as though he just finished doing something devilish, but I just can't catch him in the act." What we want to know is did you or didn't you, Jim?

> Jim's scouting has been one of fun and accomplishment. He has had the most outstanding leaders a young man could be blessed with. Jim went into the Cub program when he was 8 years old. Terry Glad was an extremely dedicated Den Mother. She set the pace for Jim's accomplishments. He was blessed again by the example and life of Dick Cloward when he became a Weblo. As he went into Blazer B's he had Sharon Cloward, Cathy Crawford, and Mike Ostler guide his scouting and help prepare him for the Priesthood. When he turned twelve years old he was graduated from Primary as a First Class Scout. In two more months he received his Star. Stafford Sorenson was the Scout Master, but within just a few weeks the Ward was divided and Frank Poulsen acted as the Ward Scout Master. Since then Dave Glad has been his Scout Master. Dave has an ability to motivate and teach young men. He has been a tremendous leader, teacher and example to Jim.

January 25 and 26, 1979, Jim went to Tracy Wigwam with his troop. In his words he describes the experience, "We shoveled snow off the boards and slept in tents. It felt like 20 degrees below zero. I didn't sleep all night."

The following year, January 26 and 27, 1980, Jim recalls another winter camp at Tracy. "We slept in a 3-sided cabin. I went with tonsilitis and came home half dead. Hot cocoa was my only salvation. I had to miss Skull Valley Camp to get my tonsils out."

Last July Jim went to the Silver Moccasin Camp on the East Fork of the Bear River. It was a great experience. This year Jim will serve on the staff at Silver Moccasin.

On May 8 and 9, 1981, Jim's troop went to Corner Canyon. Jim says, "We were rained on, blown out during the night and the next day I was burned to a crisp." I guess that's what Jim gets for using his shirt for a stretcher.

Scouting has been a source of fun as he has mingled with the great guys in his troop, a learning experience as he has studied merit badges, learned to survive in the outdoors and tried to get along better with others. He has learned leadership as he has been given excellent opportunities. We salute scouting and what it has given to Jim and to boys everywhere. Jim will always be willing to give to scouting.


Gay Bishoff was recently sustained as the Young Women's softball coach.
