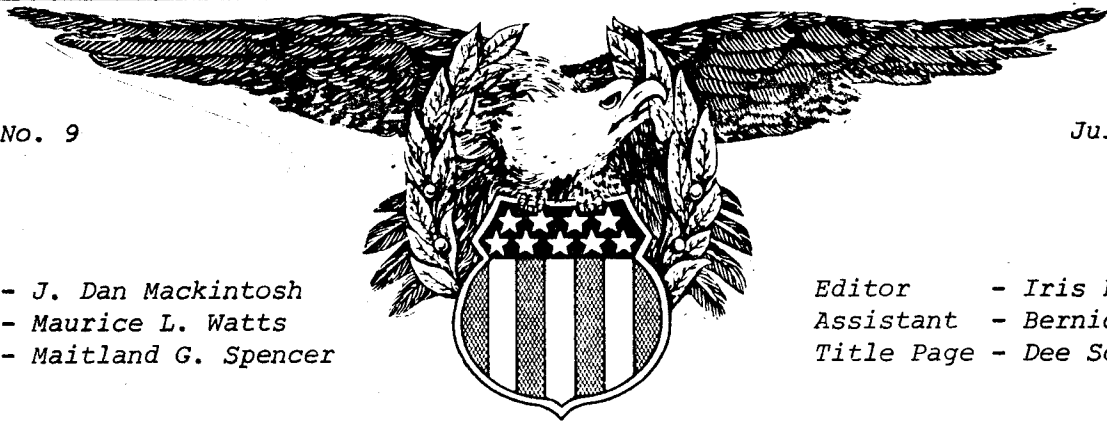

When was the last time you stood with respect when the national anthem was played; in the privacy of your home as well as in a public place where one is compelled by majority to concentrate and follow suit?

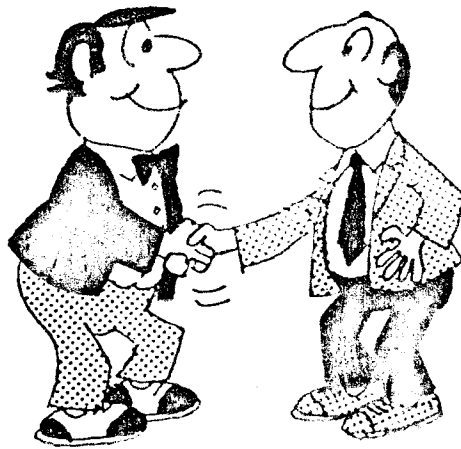

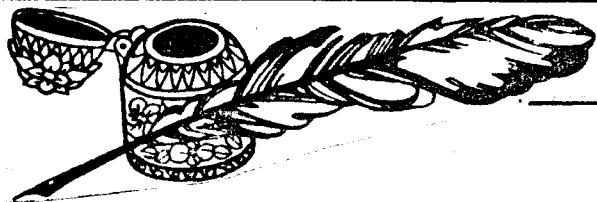


Welcome

Braşil Sao Paulo South

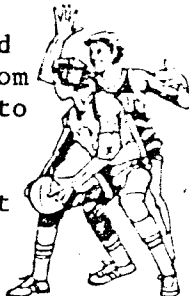
Gary is really enjoying his mission and seeing how happy the people are when they come into the Church and do that which they know is right.

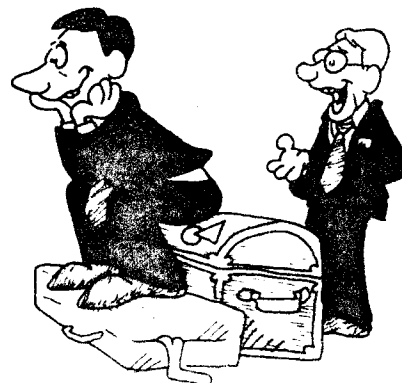


Washington Spokane

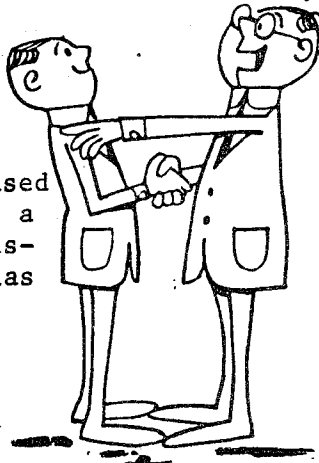
Scotland Edinburgh

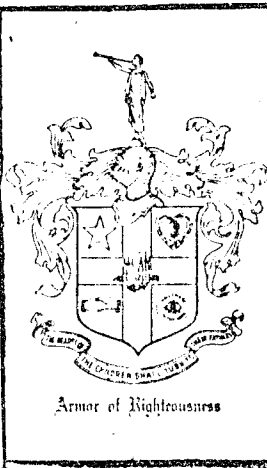
South Carolina Columbia

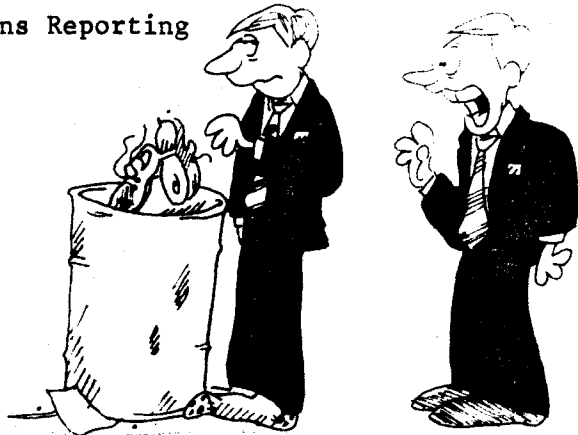
His letters are full of joy and excitement.

The time in the MTC is going fast now, and they still have much to learn.



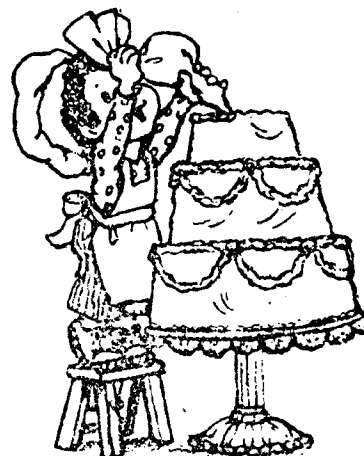

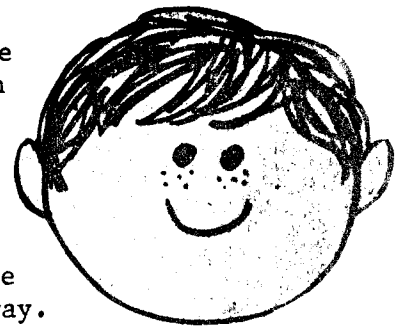
PRIMARY

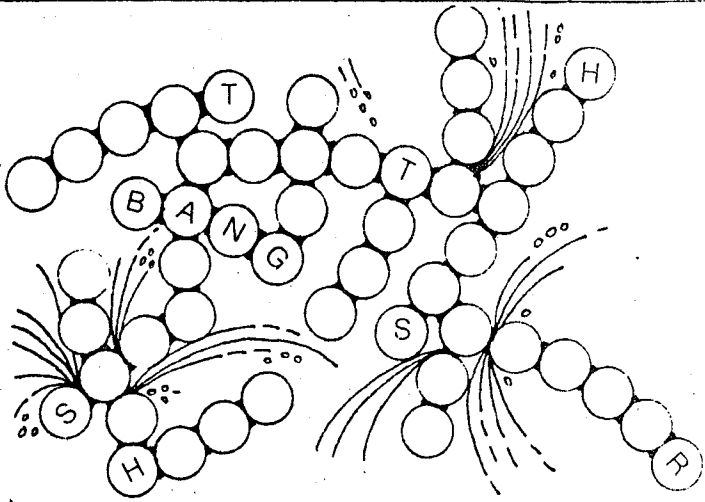
News Briefs

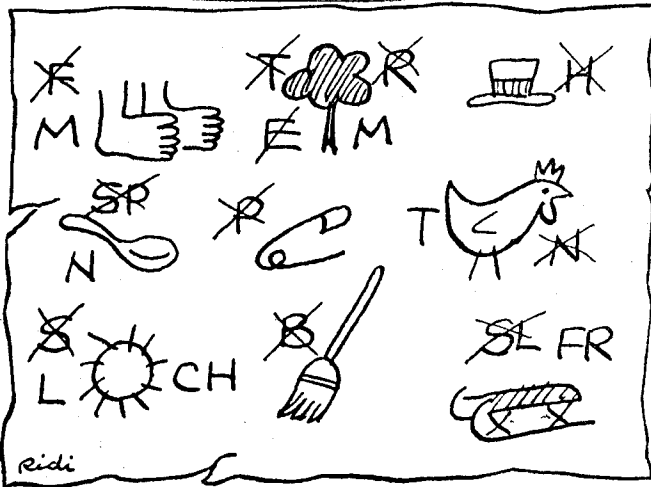


JULY PUZZLE

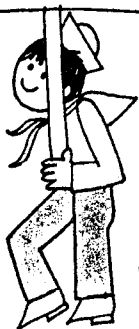

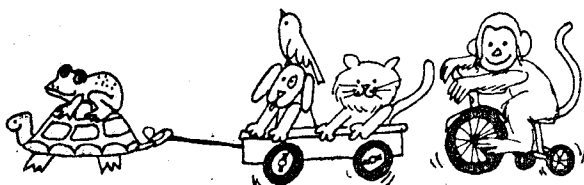

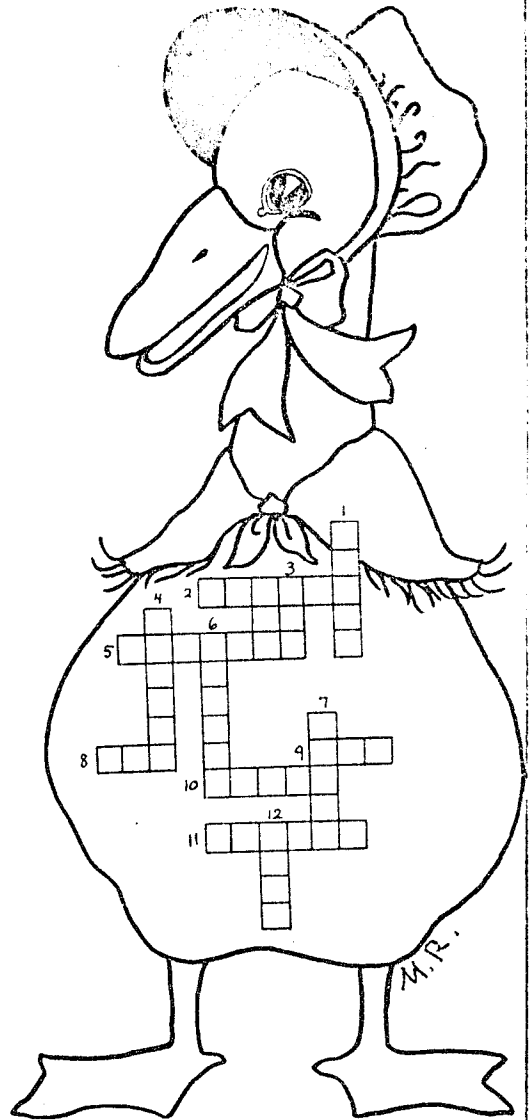
