


Scott has a companion from Arizona that had been in the Glasgow Mission. Pres. Gunn is now there, but Scott hadn't met him until his last letter.





In the afternoon we had a pineapple cheesecake. After we got through working (about 10 p.m.), we came home and you'll never believe this -- the mamita had made bacon, tomato, and lettuce sandwiches. Of course we realize that was an unusual day. And right after that, Jim was transferred from the very south of his mission to the very north. He's in Temuco, which is a big city. It should be warmer there.






France Paris

Charity is emphasized in Relief Society and these lessons will serve to increase our understanding of this principle.



If you want to offer a clinic or activity, let me know. I'd love the help!




As you see one of these objects, give yourself the correct number of points.


