

Some were committed by personal interview to Bishop Rosander or myself at tithing year-end this past year-end. However, many more saints have either not participated or participated only a token portion of their total commitment to budget thus far this year, and personally am concerned about it not becoming any easier for them between now and year-end.



As your Bishop, may I ask all members to exercise faith and prayers for the Lord to bless your families to again identify with and meet your commitments so we might be a sound in the new Butler Third Ward to meet our obligations in the service of the Lord. I promise you by the authority of my position, the windows of heaven will open and blessings will be poured out beyond measure (Malachi 3:8-12).

May the Lord bless us all in this and other worthy endeavors as we serve together.

However, he does look forward to his day to attend the Temple and talks from visiting General Authorities which give him a break from the hard studying once in a while.


Calvin is very happy and optimistic, and looking forward to his mission.


Oklahoma Tulsa




France Paris


Jim is quite impressed with his new President. President Caballero is from the area and sounds like a strong, positive, and energetic leader.




South Carolina Columbia
