



The annual POTATO HARVEST at the Stake farm is set for <u>Saturday</u>, <u>October 10</u>, beginning at <u>8:00 AM</u>. Cost to Stake members is \$5.00 per 100 lb. bag (bags will be furnished).


Potatoes will store throughout most of the winter if kept in a cool, dry and dark location. This is an excellent opportunity to add to your food storage program at a



minimal cost. An added advantage is the opportunity to go to the Stake farm with your family.

Potatoes will be machine dug and will be ready for you to bag your own. Please pay by cash or check as you pick up your potatoes.

You can reach the Stake farm by going to Elberta, Utah. When you get to the Elberta Store, go south on the paved road as far as you can go on the <u>paved road</u>. Then turn west (a right turn) and you will see the farm buildings. If you are unable to sight the potato field, ask someone for directions.




