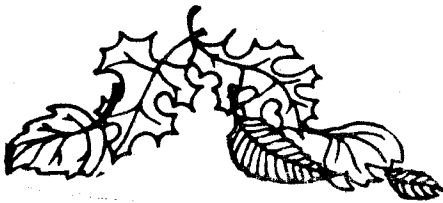

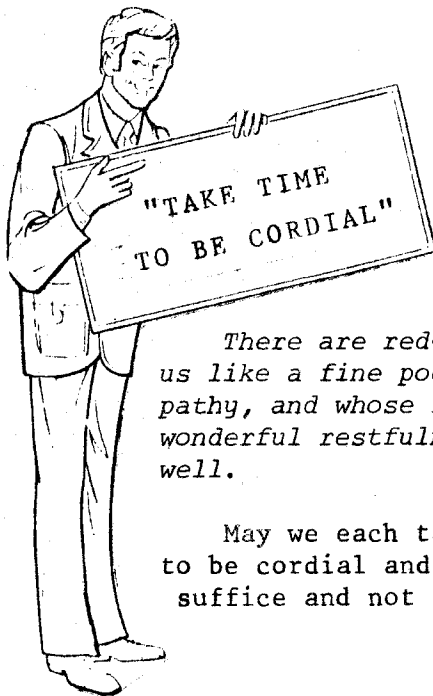

## South Africa Johannesburg

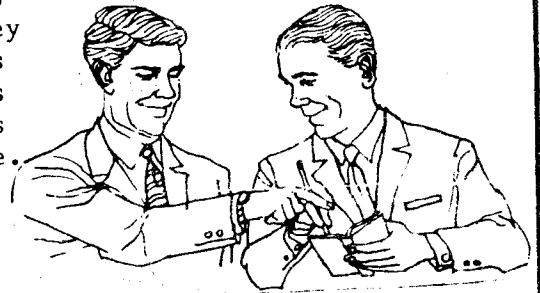

## Brasil Sao Paulo South

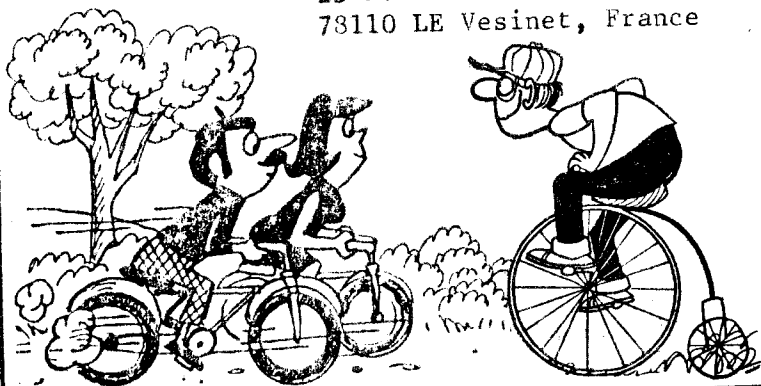

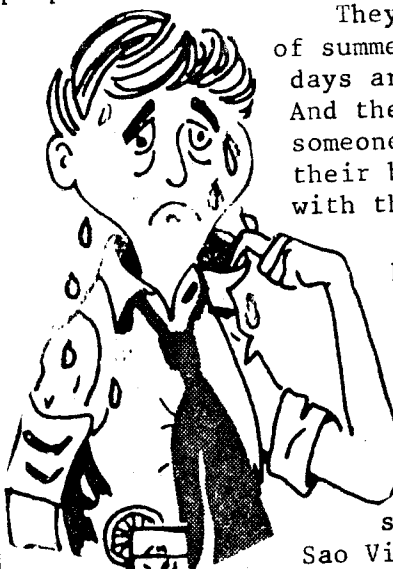


## France Paris

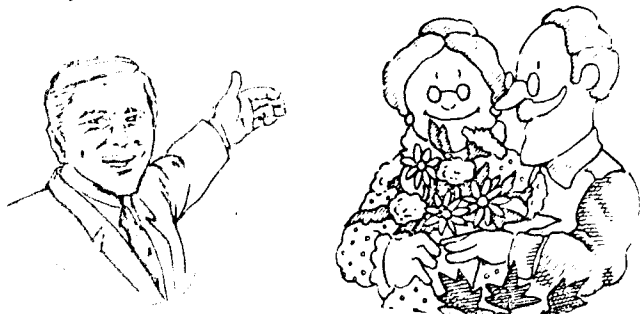
## South Carolina Columbia

Thanks to all of you who have sent letters and cards to Kyle.

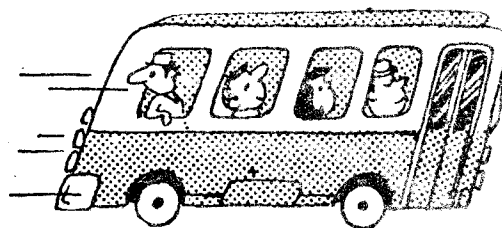

## PRIMARY

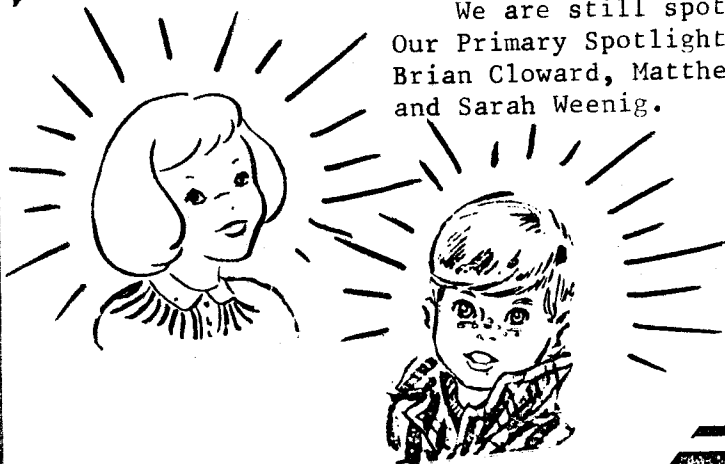

Also, many thanks to Tina Larisch for being both teacher and pianist for these many months. She really did a super job.

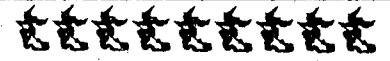

Let darkness and ingratitude take wing.

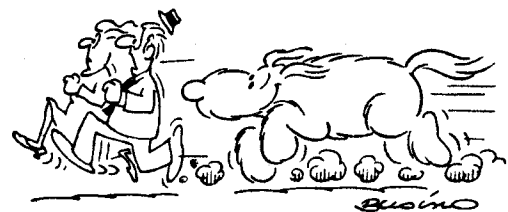
Give me humility all wrongs and ills to bear,

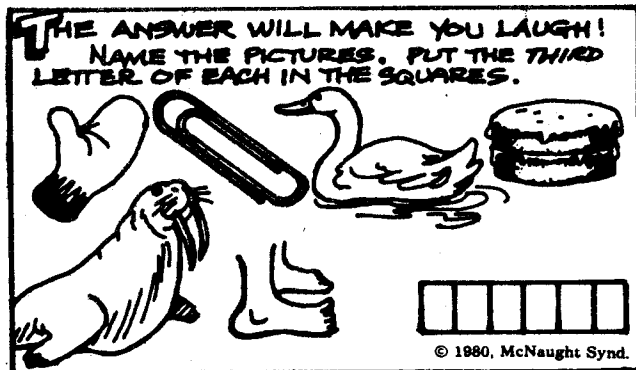
