Each has had a definite influence for good in my life, and I thank God for the Gospel of Jesus Christ and witness a blessing of patience and understanding during these ordeals, through personal witness of truthfulness in its principles.

These experiences remind me of a saying of Benjamin Franklin,
"Think of three things - whence you came, where you are going, and to Whom you must account."

May the Lord bless you always.

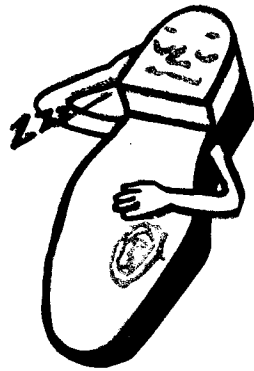

To God's Holy Kingdom, this we must understand.

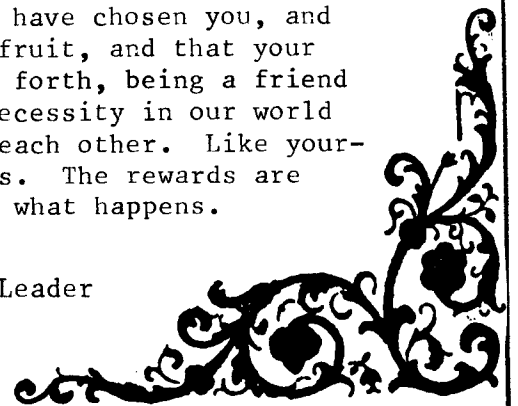

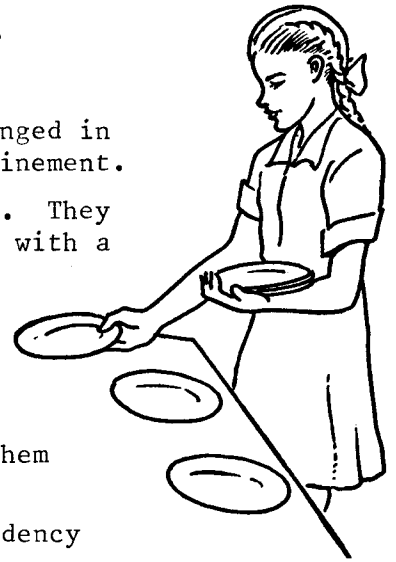
Young Women

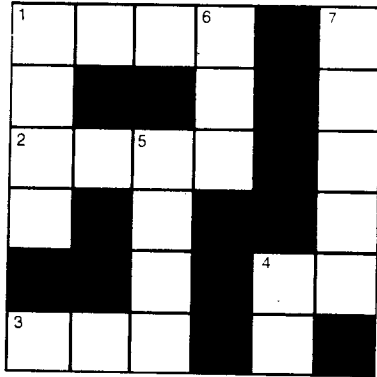

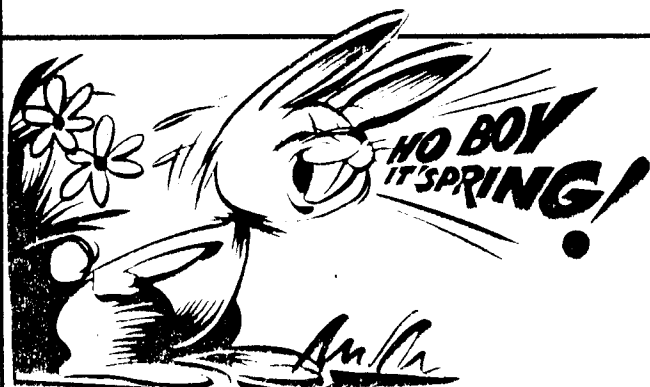
ALL OUT FOR SCOUTING!

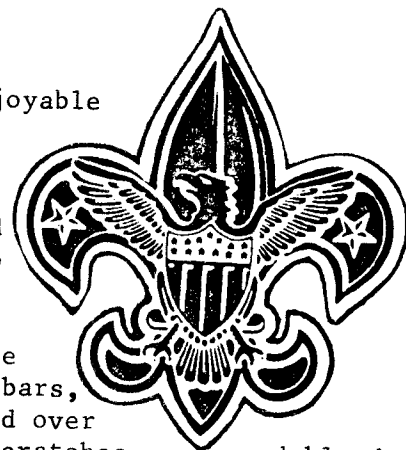

DEREK BUTTERS SCOUTING HISTORY



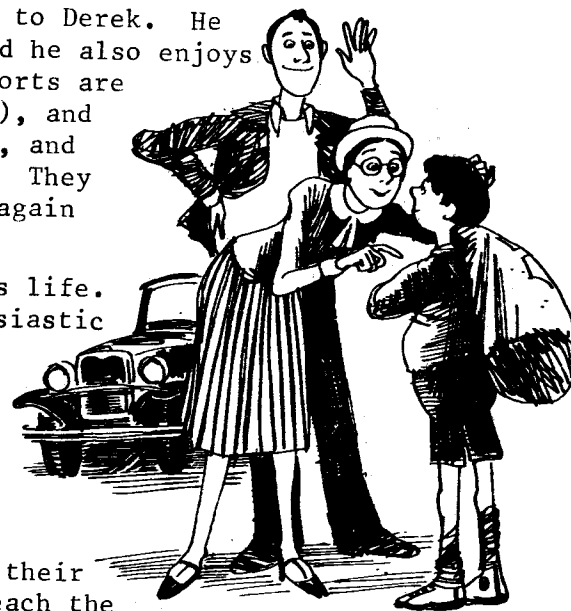

"Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do!"

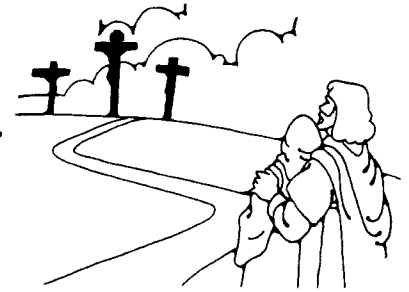
The Centurion gazing upon this majestic, lifeless form became among the first to testify.



LAST-MINUTE NEWS
