We'll be looking forward to hearing more from Todd as he begins his work in England. Best of luck, Todd!



He is really enjoying his mission and is gaining much from it.




One of Franklin's most recent letters says, "The last two weeks have been excellent for us.

Dyke was especially happy that their zone received the traveling trophy for the most baptisms the past month. Sharing the gospel has brought new growth and insight for him.




Kristen Gygi represented our ward and stake well in the Legacy Concert with her flute solo. Kristen is an outstanding flutist.

We had a tragedy and broke one sisters dish. We felt so bad and she was so sweet and kind and wanted us not to worry about it.


