




A bit of old news, but good news: on October 27th we had our annual Primary Halloween Party.

Both Kris and Becky were born and raised in the Salt Lake area. Kris has always been an athletic young man. In grade school he took the school pantathalon--top award for outstanding athletic ability. He also played on little league football teams, and in Skyline High School he was the star quarterback, as well as on the tennis team. He was also in Men's Association and on the school newspaper staff. Kris served in the Army reserves after high school, then went on a 2½-year mission to France & Switzerland. Becky also attended Skyline High School

Choir; however, she didn't meet Kris until they were both attending the University of Utah. One of Becky's friends was dating Kris, and when she introduced him to Becky, he began to turn his (4) attention toward her. During the year they dated, Becky was able to participate in the Hill Cumorah Pageant, and then she

transferred to B.Y.U. In 1972, after 3 years at the University, Kris was accepted at Northwestern Dental School in Chicago. He was able to talk Becky into becoming his bride in the Salt Lake Temple before leaving, and they began their married life by spending the first four years in the "Windy City."


