"The temple is progressing on schedule with favorable prospects of completion next June. That will be exciting and



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
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Milwaukee Wisconsin







Before baking, dilute soup with 1/4 c. milk, pour over top and add sliced fresh mushrooms. Bake uncovered 1 1/2 hours.
