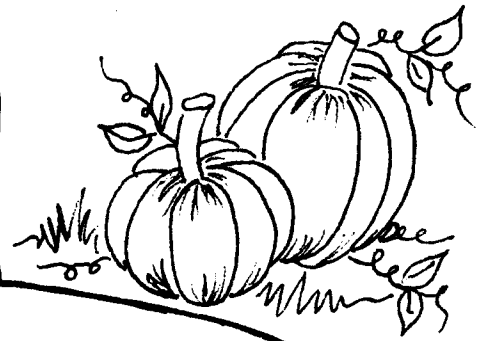

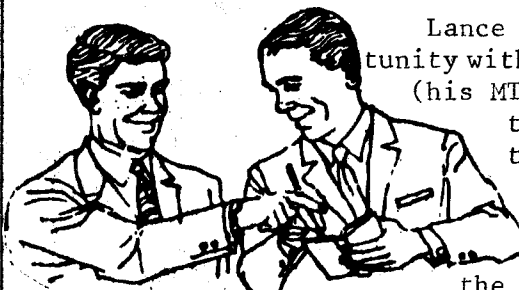
Dean has gained a real appreciation for the blessings of America, and he counsels us to be grateful for all the privileges we enjoy here.

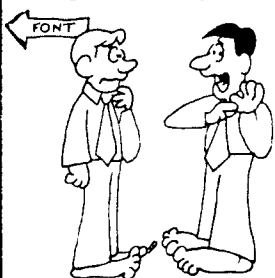
Wayne sends his greetings to the ward members and tells us that the work is progressing and all is well with him.

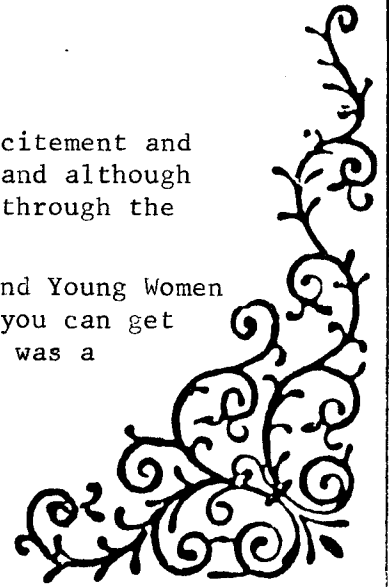
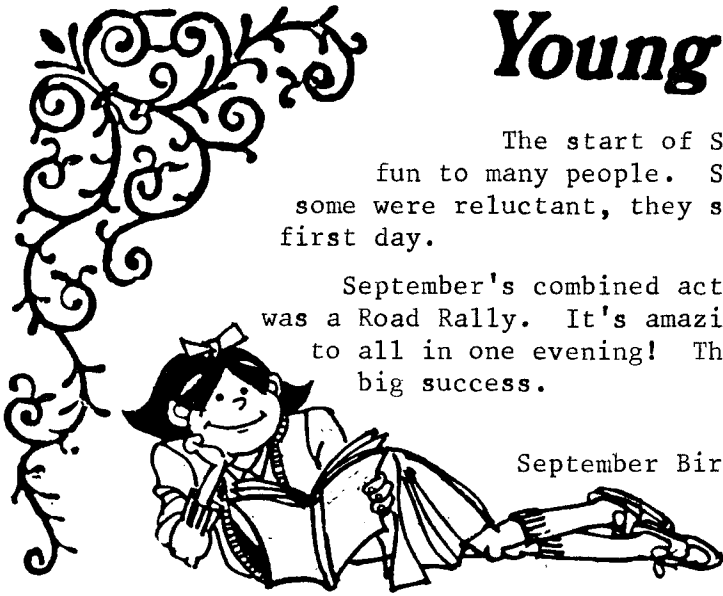
The start of September meant a lot of excitement and fun to many people. School started on the 4th, and although some were reluctant, they somehow managed to make it through the first day.

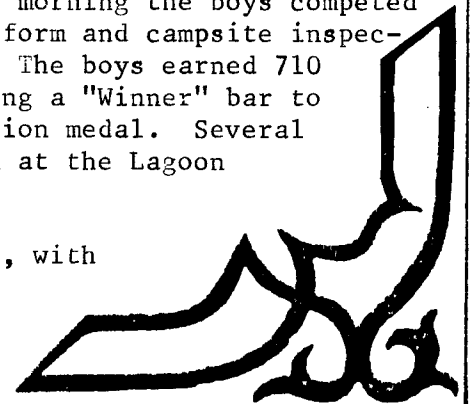
The boys spent the remainder of September learning about the Communication merit badge. They have begun "passing off" some of the requirements to Brother Rowe, counselor for the badge.

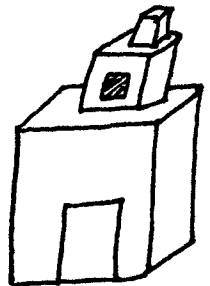

THE SILVER ROCKET

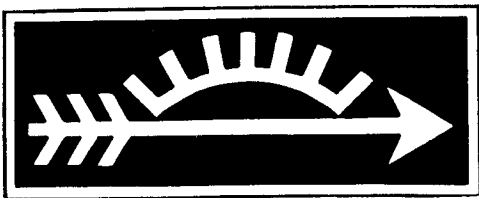

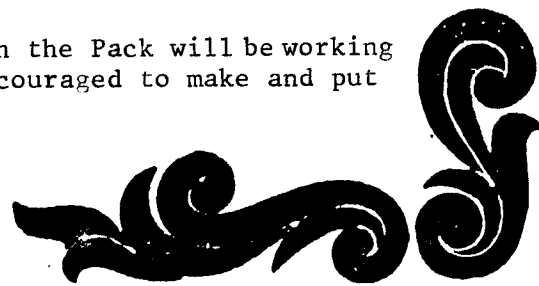

Getting Acquainted....



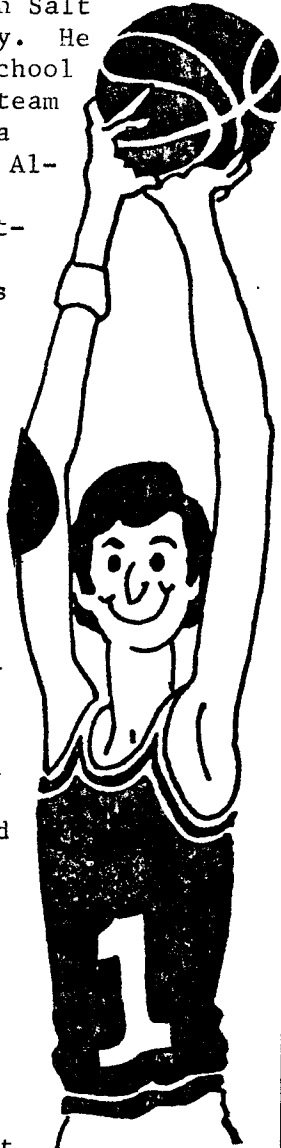

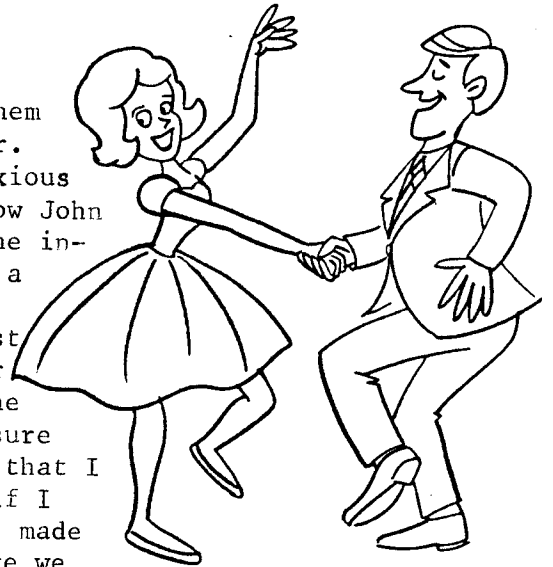

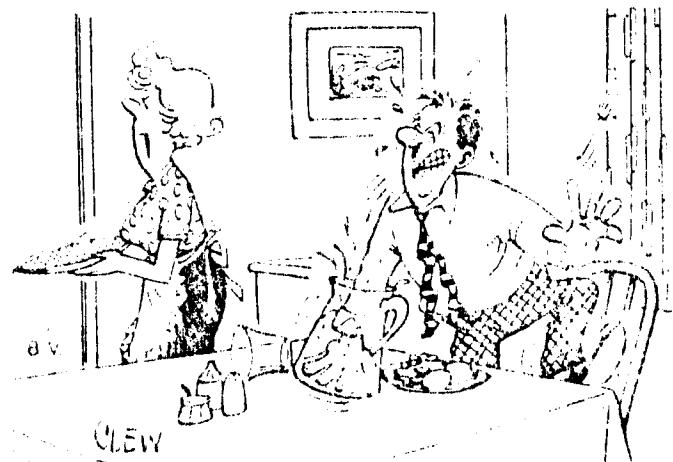
It's good to have you close by!
