
missionaries). Lance said, "To think that one year and four months ago we didn't know anything about Japanese, and now there we were translating

## England Coventry



## Missouri Independence


Wayne sends his greetings to the ward members and tells us that the work is progressing and all is well with him.


Ryan Kartchner-3, Chris Kartchner-6, Drew Glad-2, Eric Glad-3,




