Korea Seoul

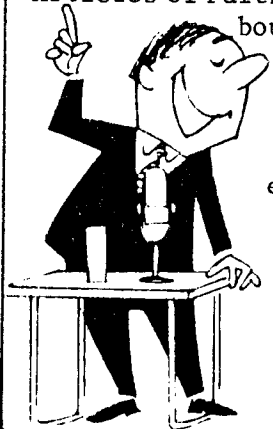

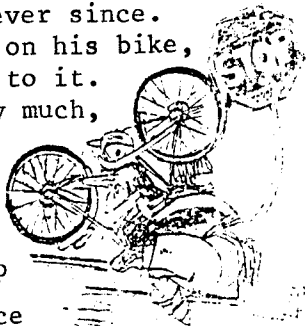

"We've just finished a two-week vacation from the temple. We traveled to the Subic Naval

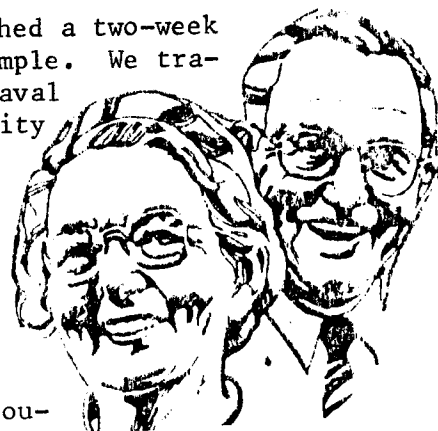

Greg says he eats noodles forevery meal and mentioned how great a "care package" would be again. We have found the true meaning of "Slow Boat To China" while Greg has been there. It takes 3 months for a package to ever get to him.

He also mentioned in a letter about being in the middle of a typhoon for a few days. They were told to stay in and not go out tracting until it was gone. They got in shorts and went up on the roof to shower in the downpour. They haven't had clean water since the storm began and even though it was exciting for them, they are looking forward to things returning to normal.

They are thrilled to be teaching two families and two young men--that is really an accomplishment. Greg loves the work and says "Hello" to everyone.

Young Women

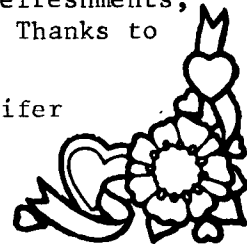

Scouts

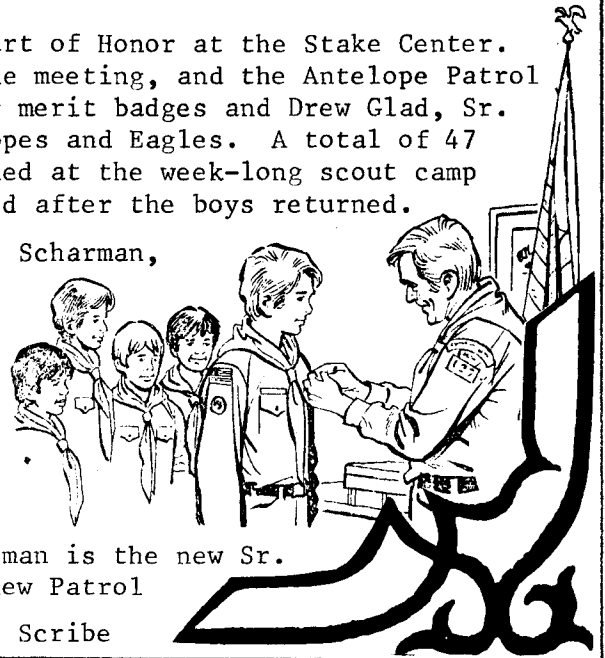
TROOP 311

Following service as a missionary in Germany for 3 years, Craig graduated cum laude from the College of Music at BYU, with a minor in German. Bonnie attended CCH (now BYU-Hawaii) for the first 3 years of her college experience, and with the direction of the Lord through many wonderful experiences, she changed from a shy, fearful girl to an outgoing, confident young lady, prepared and happy to serve and mingle with others. She finished her work at BYU in Provo and then taught 4 years in SLC as a 4th, 5th, & 6th grade teacher.

Craig and Bonnie met in a non-student singles ward at the U of U. Their first date was part of a dating marathon, and they went to the Hawaiian Smorgasboard--Craig loves to eat.
